Feature Story Pain Management and Opioid Addiction

Opioids are narcotic painkillers that have been used for years to treat pain. When brand name pills like OxyContin, Percocet, and Vicodin came on the market, they were touted as miraculous, non-addictive medications to reduce pain. Health care providers prescribed them to help patients, unintentionally creating an unhealthy culture of dependence in our country. When patients began dying from accidental opioid overdoses in record numbers and new research indicated that opioids actually exacerbate pain over the long term, the national medical dialogue changed dramatically.

At the national level, doctors are working with policy makers to set dose limits, define clinical guidelines and create best practices. At the local level, a coalition called Safe Rx Mendocino is working with Assemblyman Jim Wood, who introduced legislation to regulate opioid prescription practices in California.

Mendocino County, like many around the country, has high opioid prescription rates. <u>HealthyMendocino.com</u> has pulled data from the California Department of Justice's Controlled Substance Utilization Review to show that as of January, there are 718 opioid prescriptions per 10,000 population in our area. Also, about 5 percent of people in Mendocino County have a prescription for opioids (and this number does not address those who use opioid pain killers without prescriptions). Oral Health for Mendocino County

In early 2018, Mendocino County, Health and Human Services, Public Health, Prevention and Planning Unit was one of 61 Local Health Departments who was awarded 5 years of funding from the State of California, Department of Public Health to develop and implement a county-wide Oral Health Plan with the primary focus for the underserved and vulnerable populations. In addition, priority service areas will be provided to Kindergarten through sixth grade students.

June Featured Indicators



This indicator shows the rate of prescriptions of opioid drugs in patient's locale per 10,000 population. Opioids are natural or synthetic chemicals that bind to receptors in your brain or body. Common opioids include heroin and prescription dugs such as oxycodone, hydrocodone, and fentanyl. Opioid abuse is a serious public health issue, but preventive actions, limiting the number of opioid prescriptions, and treatment for addition to prevent future use can help.

Since 1999, the rate of overdose deaths involving opioids (including prescription opioid pain relievers) nearly quadrupled. According to the CDC, overdoses from prescription opioid pain relievers are a driving



This indicator shows the percentage of children aged 0-20 who used preventative dental services in the past year. Preventative dentistry helps avoid cavities, gum disease, enamel wear, and many more oral issues. To maintain optimal oral health, the American Dental Association recommends regular visits to the dentist, in addition to teaching children proper oral hygiene and best practices at an early age. Dental cleanings and exams allow dentists to identify problems and take care of them immediately instead of them growing into larger, more complicated issues. Additionally, other preventative services can further help children's oral health and include in addition to examinations and cleanings: fullmouth and other x-rays, flouride treatments, space maintainers, and


