SUBJECT: 2015 IN-HOSPITAL BREASTFEEDING DATA

The California Department of Public Health's (CDPH), Center for Family Health (CFH) is pleased to announce the release of the California 2015 in-hospital breastfeeding initiation rates. The CFH monitors the in-hospital infant feeding practices utilizing data obtained during routine newborn screening for genetic diseases. These data are posted on the CDPH Breastfeeding Statistics website at <u>http://cdph.ca.gov/breastfeedingdata</u>.

We encourage you to review your hospital's breastfeeding rates to identify how successful your facility is in promoting and supporting exclusive breastfeeding in the early post-partum period. Please take advantage of the attached resources to assist you with quality improvement efforts to ensure policies and practices support exclusive breastfeeding. Establishing evidence-based breastfeeding policies will support your hospital efforts to comply with the Joint Commission's Perinatal Care Core Measure on exclusive breast milk feeding guidelines. In addition, this will support legislation requiring hospitals with perinatal units to have evidenced-based policies and practices that supports breastfeeding (California Health & Safety Codes §123366 and §123367). Working together, we will build hospital environments in which staff and patients consider breastfeeding as natural and normal.




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Data to Monitor Progress in Hospital Policies and Practices that Support Breastfeeding

Hospital Breastfeeding Data: The California Department of Public Health (CDPH) has released 2015 inhospital breastfeeding initiation rates. Hospital staff and administrators can use this information to examine the percentage of women who initiate "exclusive" or "any" breastfeeding at their hospital in comparison to similar hospitals and the state rate.

California in-hospital breastfeeding rates increased from 2010 to 2015. The rate of any breastfeeding increased from 90.8% to 93.9%, while exclusive breastfeeding rates increased from 56.6% to 68.6%. This translates to an overall decrease in formula supplementation from 34.2% to 25.3% during this time period. Although improvements were seen across all racial/ethnic groups, disparities in breastfeeding initiation persist.


<u>Maternity Practices in Infant Nutrition and Care (mPINC) Survey</u>: The Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) released 2013 Maternity Practices in Infant Nutrition and Care (mPINC) Survey results to all participating hospitals and birth centers in the United States. Each participating facility received a customized mPINC Benchmark Report that addresses barriers to evidence-based maternity care related to breastfeeding. Hospitals are encouraged to utilize their mPINC report to support quality improvement efforts within the maternity care setting. 
Baby Friendly Hospital Initiative:

Hospital Infant Feeding and Care Requirements

<u>The Joint Commission's Perinatal Care Core Measure Set:</u> The Joint Commission has expanded the mandatory performance measure requirements for accredited hospitals with 300 or more births per year to include the Perinatal Care Core Measure Set that includes exclusive breast milk feeding. The United States Breastfeeding Committee (USBC) produced a resource entitled "Implementing the Joint Commission Perinatal Core Measure on Exclusive Breast Milk Feeding" found at <u>www.usbreastfeeding.org</u>.

<u>Hospital Infant Feeding Act</u>: The Hospital Infant Feeding Act (California Health & Safety Code §123366) requires all California hospitals with a perinatal unit to have an infant feeding policy. Policies need to promote breastfeeding and utilize guidance from the Baby-Friendly Hospital Initiative (<u>www.babyfriendlyusa.org/</u>) or the State Department of Public Health Model Hospital Policy Recommendations (<u>http://cdph.ca.gov/Breastfeeding</u>) and must be clearly posted and routinely communicated to staff.

<u>California Health & Safety Codes §123367</u> requires that by 2025 all hospitals with a perinatal unit adopt the "Ten Steps to Successful Breastfeeding" per Baby Friendly USA's <u>Baby-Friendly Hospital Initiative</u>, or an alternate process that includes evidenced-based policies and practices and targeted outcomes.

<u>The Regional Perinatal Programs of California (RPPC)</u>: RPPC is a network of regional public health consultants that promote access to risk appropriate perinatal care for pregnant women and their infants and can assist hospitals in implementing breastfeeding quality improvement. <u>Women, Infants and Children (WIC)</u>: WIC provides prenatal breastfeeding education, breast pumps when needed, and, in some areas, peer counselors to support breastfeeding mothers.
